We start to feel anxiety, our stress levels rapidly increase, gambling overtakes all other forms of pleasure and we replace everything with the need to gamble.





Impact to the Employer due to gambling issues.

- The impact on employers is a factor to be considered and shows the wider impacts of compulsive gambling, as it can lead to the following:
- ☐ Gambling related absenteeism.
- □A reduction in productivity.
- ☐ Issues with mental health and changes in personality.
- □Criminality in the workplace.
- □A loss of brand reputation and organisational damage.









Life becomes worse than death!

Government reports show that on average:

- $\square 114 496$ deaths by suicide are directly related to gambling issues.
- This is at a cost of £241.1 million -£961.7 million which represents the societal value of life, and the years lost to suicide associated with gambling.
- □ It is estimated that one person with a gambling addiction loses their life to suicide every day.
- One in five (19%) of problem gamblers have considered suicide at least once.
